Mid-Autumn Festival Assembly



The Mid-Autumn Festival is a traditional Chinese folk festival. Since ancient times, there have been many folk customs, such as offering sacrifices to the moon, appreciating the moon, eating moon cakes, playing lanterns, guessing lantern riddles, appreciating Osmanthus flowers and drinking Osmanthus wine, which have been handed down to us for a long time. The folk lantern riddles are an art form of Chinese folk literature. It is the wisdom and crystallization of the people in long-term labor practice. It comes from life and is used for life. It is also a kind of intellectual activity game that people like to see.

On September 17, ISP teachers and students dressed in traditional Chinese costumes and participated in the Mid-Autumn Festival themed assembly.

In the Grade one assembly, five children were on the stage to tell a story about the Mid-Autumn Festival myth. After the story, they also answered some questions about the stories. The students listened attentively and answered the questions actively.





In the G2 to G5 assemblies, students had a riddle guessing event.

8. The wind is fair and the sea is calm. (a name of city in China)

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


